

Reflections on the Sunday Readings:

Easter Vigil: From the beginning of Creation, through the desert and slavery in Egypt, through exile in Babylon. Via the wisdom of the prophets, and the rise and fall of God's people. Through ministry, crucifixion, death and burial in a tomb. The most important story of our faith is told in the dark tonight. Under darkest cover of night we can tell the story of the meaning of all of life's suffering; Jesus is with us in it, rising from it and bringing all creation with him. This is not just another story. It is the heart of everything we believe. Death is not the final word. There is no darkness, no suffering, no destruction that God will not turn to glory. Whatever pain we are carrying, we can have hope that if it still hurts, we just haven't gotten to the end of the story yet.

When a dear friend of mine was dying, she shared a message with me that God had sent her; "Jesus whispered to me that whether I live or die, I will live." Just as God shared this with her, so the angel in the Vigil Gospel proclaims to each one of us; "He has been raised from the dead... This is my message for you!" May we live by this joy tonight and into the rest of eternity.

Easter Sunday: In today's world we equate mystery with a puzzle to be solved; follow the clues and the solution becomes obvious. But John's account of the first Easter morning reveals a more profound understanding of mystery. Mystery is an experience into which we enter. It may lead to an encounter with the transcendent God.

John's Gospel for Easter morning is rich with emotion. Mary Magdalene, Simon Peter and the other disciple (probably the evangelist himself) each respond differently to the enigma of the empty tomb. When the two male disciples see the

burial cloths, they turn around and run back home. While the unnamed disciple, who sees and believes, seems to solve the mystery of the empty tomb, he misses a critical component of the experience—meeting the resurrected Lord.

Mary Magdalene, however, is willing to sit with her confusion and grief. She remains in the dark, weeping and unknowing. She allows mystery to enfold her and thus she encounters the Risen Jesus. Empowered through her experience, she is the herald of the resurrection, announcing, "I have seen the Lord."

As we participate in this Easter Sunday liturgy, we are full of gratitude for the mystery of the Eucharist wherein we encounter the Risen Christ. Let us rejoice and be glad. Alleluia, Alleluia!
